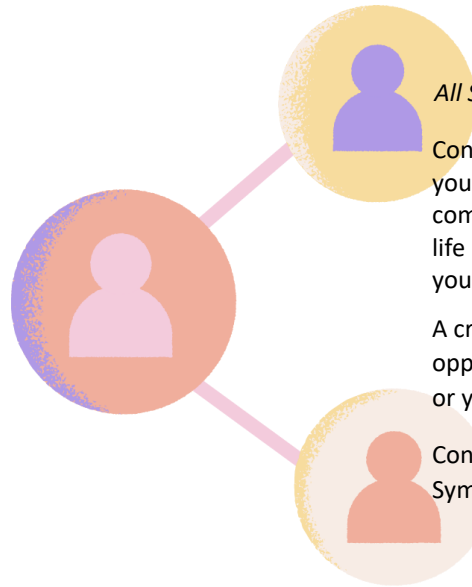
Executive Director, Governor's Office of Community Service

Shane is helping lead the commemoration of Yellowstone Park's 150th birthday with the installation of an Intertribal Teepee Village near Gardiner in August. Shane lives in Bozeman with his wife Megkian and their 5 children.

Kristen Juras grew up on her family's ranch near Conrad. As an attorney in private practice in Great Falls, Juras helped farmers, ranchers, and small business owners navigate legal issues, and she provided pro bono services to clients with disabilities who confront homelessness and addiction.

A fourth-generation Montanan, Lieutenant Governor Juras graduated from the University of Montana and the University of Georgia School of Law. She taught at the University of Montana Law School for 20 years. Married since 1984, Kristen and John Juras have three sons and two grandchildren.

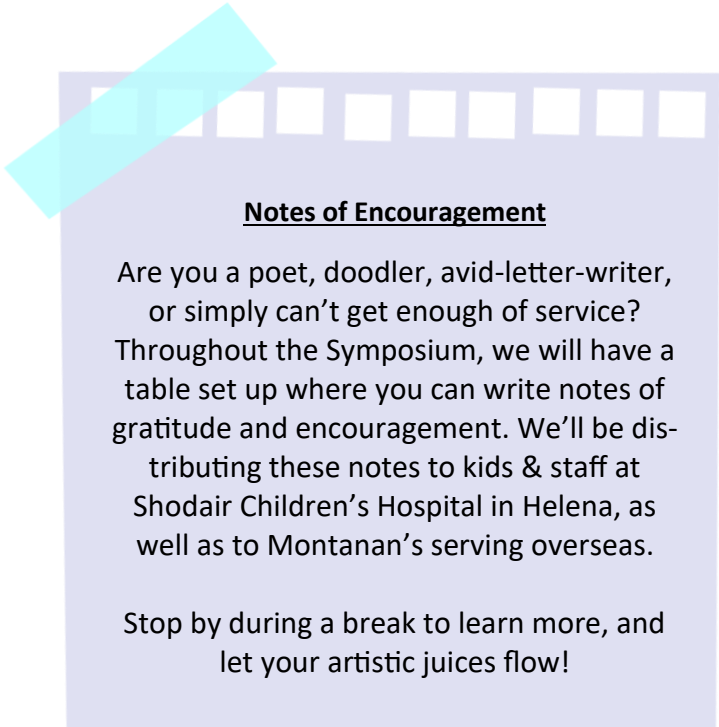

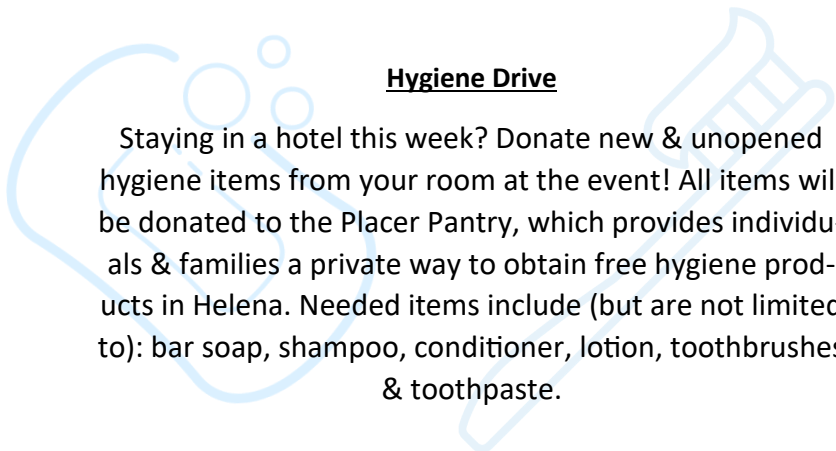

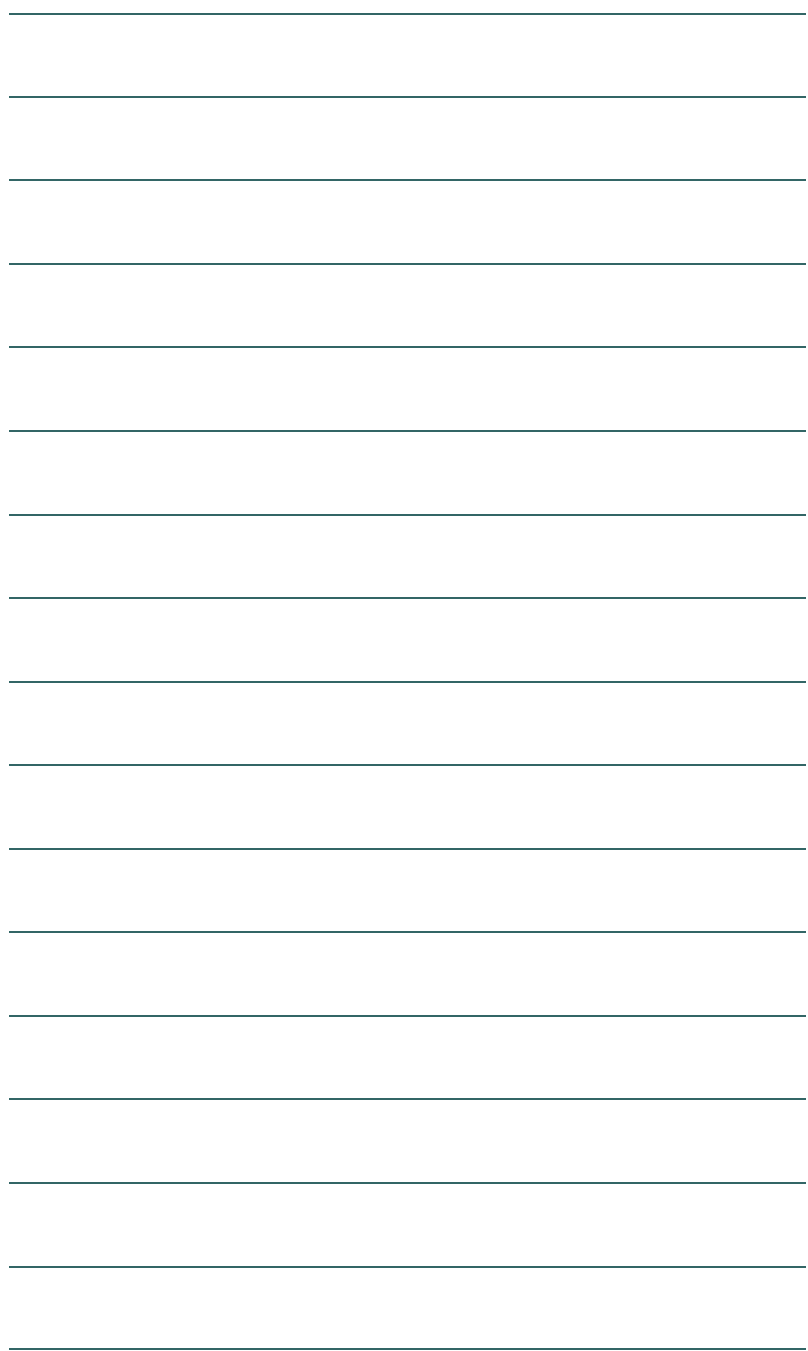
